It discusses ways to measure teacher quality, examines several indicators of quality, such as student achievement and principals' ratings of their staffs, and then uses these findings to assess the evidence on salary growth and teacher recruitment. It looks at what has gone wrong with teacher recruitment and offers an analysis of the operation of the teacher labor market so as to interpret findings. These results are used to review the implications for teacher recruitment of various other reforms of current interest. The text also describes the prospects for reform by examining salary differentiation and rising standards and assesses personnel policies in the private sector to see whether private schools offer a model for reforming public education. This section details teacher quality, working conditions, and compensation policies. The book concludes with a summation of its major points. This report examines the desirability of teaching as a career, from a historical perspective. Focusing on the profession's economic reward structure and social composition, the study attempts to guide future case-study research. Teaching has become a far more desirable occupation during the twentieth century. Teachers today enjoy more freedom and autonomy than did their nineteenth-century predecessors. Nevertheless, it has always been difficult to recruit talented teachers and to retain those willing to give teaching a try. Until recently, the availability of relatively well-qualified women eased recurrent teacher shortages and provided a cushion that allowed districts to keep financial incentives low. But as women have begun to exploit career opportunities in other fields, they no longer constitute a captive labor pool for the teaching profession. The desirability of teaching as an occupation may soon be put to its most serious test, as school districts compete for labor in an increasingly open market.

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
