Written three years before "The Mikado," the plot revolves around Alvin, a young man, who pretends to be a Japanese nobleman in order to impress the father of his dream girl. After its Broadway engagement in 1886, where its run was extended by popular demand, the operetta went on to be produced across the country with over 2,000

performances and continued to be produced into the 20th century.

as Maxim Gorky , was a Russian and Soviet writer, a founder of the socialist realism literary method and a political activist. He was also a five-time nominee for the Nobel Prize in Literature. Gorky's most famous works were *The Lower Depths* (1902), *Twenty-six Men and a Girl*, *The Song of the Stormy Petrel*, *My Childhood*, *The Mother*, *Summerfolk* and *Children of the Sun*. He had an association with fellow Russian writers Leo Tolstoy and Anton Chekhov; Gorky would later mention them in his memoirs.
