extravaganza. A phenomenon of the 19th

Century, "The Black Crook" was the Broadway blockbuster musical of its day. With its suggestive story of wickedness, its chorus of scantily clad chorus girls, and its breathtaking scenic efforts it was, as The New York Times claimed, "decidedly the event of this spectacular age." Considered the first "book musical" because it supposedly interrogated music and dialogue into a unified story, its creation has become the basis that America invited musical theatre. After it opened in September of 1866 at the 3,200-seat Niblo's Garden on Broadway, the musical ran for a record-breaking 475 performances, toured throughout the United States and England, was revived numerous times, and copied by other musicals for the next three decades.

This book highlights the most terrifying moments in theater history, from classical plays like Aeschylus' *Prometheus Bound* and Euripides' *Medea* to the violence of the Grand Guignol company productions in 18th-century France, and present-day productions like Stephen Sondheim's musical *Sweeney Todd*, Stephen King's *Carrie* and dark 21st-century plays by Clive Barker and Conor McPherson. The musical is based on a 1944 novel by Margaret Landon, *Anna and the King of Siam*, which in turn was adapted from the real-life reminiscences of Anna Leonowens, as recounted in her own books, *The English Governess at the Siamese Court* and *The Romance of the Harem*. It is 1862 in Siam when an English widow, Anna Leonowens, arrives with her young son at the Royal Palace in Bangkok, having been summoned by the King to serve as tutor to his many children and wives. The King is largely considered to be a barbarian by those in the West, and he seeks Anna's assistance in changing his image, if not his ways. With both keeping a firm grip on their respective traditions and values, Anna and the King grow to understand and, eventually, respect one another in a truly unique love story. Along with the dazzling score, the incomparable Jerome Robbins ballet *The Small House of Uncle Thomas* is one of the all-time marvels of the musical stage.
