worked as a painter and illustrator before starting to write novels. He had his literary breakthrough in 2010 with *Tschick*, which has sold more than a million copies in Germany. By this point he was already suffering from an incurable brain tumour. He continued to write for the next few years, completing *Sand*, which won the 2012 Leipzig Book Fair prize. He also documented his

experiences of fighting his illness on a blog, *Arbeit and Struktur*, which was later published in book form. In 2013 he took his own life.

had a steeper road to climb than the average kid, but he ends up learning something about personal power, friendship, first love, and how to fit in the world.
