 The 5 International Conference on the Progress in Alzheimer's Disease and Parkinson's Disease took place from March 31 to April 5 \ 2001 in Kyoto, Japan. This international conference was organized as a joint Congress with the 9 International Catecholamine Symposium. A total of 1258 clinicians and researchers participated in this joint congress from 38 countries in the world. This book represents the proceedings of the 5 Conference on Alzheimer's and Parkinson's disease. The International Conference on the Progress in Alzheimer's and

Parkinson's disease was first launched by Professor Abraham Fisher of Israel and Professor Israel Hanin of USA. The first conference was held in Eilat, Israel in 1985. The second conference was organized in Kyoto, Japan in 1989; the third one in Chicago, USA, in 1993, and the fourth one in Eilat, Israel in 1997. The International Catecholamine Symposium (ICS) is an international meeting devoted to the development of basic as well as clinical research on catecholamines. The first Catecholamine Symposium was held in Bethesda, USA in 1958. Since then this symposium has occurred every 5 years. Professor Toshiharu Nagatsu was appointed as the president of the 9 International Catecholamine Symposium, which was to be held in 2001 also in Japan. Therefore, we decided to organize a joint congress of the two meetings, because there is much overlap in research between Alzheimer's disease, Parkinson's disease, and catecholamines. We thank Professor Nagatsu very much for

agreeing to organizing this joint congress.

As a Jew, growing up in the 1940s and 1950s in Brooklyn, I was fascinated by Adolf Hitler: Why did he hate the Jews? Why did he hate me? My fascination with Hitler and the Nazis was carried into college where I majored in German history. In 1959 I entered the New York University School of Medicine and studied at Bellevue Hospital. While studying neurology, I forgot about Adolf Hitler. Then in the late 1970s reports began to surface that Hitler had Parkinson disease. I became fascinated with whether Hitler indeed had Parkinson disease. My fascination with Hitler's Parkinson disease culminated in my being asked to review the Hitler Diaries in 1983. I was one of the experts who testified that the diaries were forgeries. The basis for writing *Furor: Hitler and the Frog* came when someone asked me what I would do if I, as a Parkinson expert, were asked to treat Adolf Hitler. As a Parkinson expert I have treated some notorious people, people who, were I not an expert, I would never want to see. Disease humbles everyone even awful people. This is what I try to convey in the novel.

Muslim and Jew: Origins, Growth, Resentment seeks to show how and why Islam and Judaism have been involved in political and theological self-definitions using the other since the seventh century.
