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The Victorian Age is considered to be the Heyday of the gentlemanly ideal, both in society and in

literature. Indeed, the Victorian period developed a quasi obsession with gentility and gentlemanliness. In the late 18th century, Edmund Burke already emphasized "the spirit of gentleman" and complained that "The age of chivalry [was] gone... and the glory of Europe [was] extinguished ...The Figure of the Gentleman in 19th century Victorian ...During the Victorian era, when someone was called Victorian gentlemen, it meant that they did not need to work in order to earn money or perform any manual labour in order to live and survive. Also, this type of man was classified by owning their own land and having a particularly generous income. A Victorian gentleman was also classified by a person who never inflicts pain to anyone.
