It focuses on the fundamentals of language learning--vocabulary, morphology, and syntax--in a maximally efficient and

enriching way. The page for each day presents: 2 new vocabulary words, with transliteration and definitions, beginning with the most common words and proceeding to the rarest, the English text of a verse from Daniel or Ezra, with the day's 2 Aramaic words embedded in it, as they appear in the verse and the Aramaic text of the verse, in full and then divided into phrases or clauses, with the corresponding English phrases or clauses next to them. More than 1/3 of the words in Biblical Aramaic appear only once in the Bible.
