Nonverbal learning disability (NLD) is described as a subtype of specific learning disability where the source of the disability is a difficulty in processing

nonverbal information. The child with NLD presents with problems in visual, spatial, and tactile perception but with strengths in rote verbal skills. Traditionally, these children were recognized by their difficulties in arithmetic which presented a stark contrast with their strengths in spelling and decoding text. They also exhibited a split between their verbal IQ (VIQ) and performance

IQ (PIQ) scores with the VIQ being significantly higher than PIQ. Over time, however, diagnostic criteria have evolved and the broadened definition of the NLD syndrome has led many to question the utility and uniqueness of the NLD diagnosis. The prevalence of preeclampsia (PE), a pregnancy-specific hypertensive disorder, is significantly higher in women with type 1

diabetes mellitus (T1DM) than in non-diabetic women. Observational studies, mostly cross-sectional in non-diabetic women, have associated higher levels of oxidative stress and lower antioxidant enzymes and vitamins in PE cases versus controls. The prospective study reported by our group is the first to correlate α - and β -carotene deficiencies in pregnant T1DM women

with subsequent development of PE. Among antioxidant nutrients of interest in PE, vitamins C and E have been most extensively studied in experimental models and clinical trials. The largest clinical trial on vitamins C and E supplementation in women with T1DM revealed no overall reduction in risk for PE, but a significant reduction was found in the subgroup of women with low baseline

levels of these vitamins. Emerging research shows potential effects for l-arginine, a combination of B vitamins and trace minerals, and vitamin D in reducing risk for PE, although their effects in pregnancies complicated by diabetes remain to be clarified.
