From its beginnings, the European Union has resounded with debate over whether to move toward a federal or intergovernmental system. In the ten years that have followed, much has changed in Germany, from the rise of Helmut Kohl as Europe's leading statesman to the return of the government to Berlin, the city that symbolises the nation's greatest triumphs and defeats.
