While policymakers' immediate priorities are to address the health crisis and moderate the short-term economic losses, the likely long-term consequences of the pandemic highlight the need to forcefully

undertake comprehensive reform programs to improve the fundamental drivers of economic growth, once the crisis abates. consensus on what should change and what should remain unaltered.
