Less a how-to manual than a tribute to an impossible and impossibly rewarding profession, *It Won't Be Easy* captures the experience of teaching in all its messy glory. The book follows a year of teaching, with each chapter tackling a different aspect of the job. Pulling no punches (and resisting no punch lines), he writes about establishing yourself in a new building; teaching meaningful classes, keeping

students a priority; investigating how race, gender, and identity affect your work; and why it's a good idea to keep an extra pair of pants at school. understand that, while there are no simple answers, there is power in learning to ask the right questions.
