These serve at least a dual purpose: (1) They provide opportunity for you to carry on your studies in a more detailed and intensive manner whenever you wish to do so; (2) They provide information regarding matters which could be given only passing mention. You will find that the "Discussion Questions" at the end of the chapters will be

valuable for testing your grasp of the materials you have studied.
