Charles Ray's commentary is unique in that he emphasizes the personal, practical results Paul wanted to encourage every Christian to strive for in their daily walk. Here the reader will be challenged to see the goals Paul had in mind, and to incorporate them in his or her own life.

What if the government had to meet the standards routinely imposed on nuclear power plants? The author, Charles Ray Jones, provides a simplified decision-making and problem resolution process using a distillation of the high-reliability factors and processes demanded of those, for example, who ensure the safe operation of nuclear power plants. Starting with his graduation from the U. S. Naval Academy in 1966 and entry into the Nuclear Propulsion Program, he rose to the position of top Nuclear Chief Engineer Instructor. He was responsible for the testing and startup of the advanced reactors in the first of the class USS Nimitz CVN 68 nuclear powered aircraft carrier. He continued his 5-decade nuclear-related career as a consultant to the U. S. Department of Energy and the U. S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission. He then became an instructor for employees of all Federal Agencies regarding classified nuclear weapon and uranium enrichment technologies. His career encompassed a demanding technical paradigm (Technidigm) as well as fundamental, underlying elements of integrity and honor necessary to do the hard right instead of the easy wrong. He holds two masters degrees from MIT and another from Johns Hopkins. His distillation of his extensive practical knowledge and management experience in the nuclear industry, forming the "12 Technidigm Elements of Common Sense" in the mid-1990's, has emerged in 2021 as "The Technidigm Protocol," further simplifying the "12 Elements of Common Sense" into three progressive parts. Those able to understand and master all 12 parts are well on their way to becoming "Technidigm Masters." As one might expect, it takes the skills, experience, and insights of "Technidigm Masters" to achieve results such as certifiably safe nuclear power plants. All other undertakings (with the possible exception of advanced space flight projects) are of lesser demand but often also involve public safety and even environmental protection. Those readers able to make it through the first two parts of "The Technidigm Protocol" can at least become "Technidigm Practitioners" and actually take on the responsibility of producing plans and solutions to issues, problems, and projects requiring increasingly high levels of expertise, dedication, and integrity. Nevertheless, it is best to rely on "Technidigm Masters" to execute proposed solutions. Finally, those who manage to only get through the first part of the book are "Technidigm Novices" since they are at least able to recognize when those around them are applying the "12 Technidigm Elements of Common Sense." That is, a "Technidigm Novice" can easily recognize when a manager, a politician, or even a news journalist is failing to address all 12 elements of an issue. In that regard, a "Technidigm Novice" can appear to be the smartest person in the room. In addition, using Appendix A as a model, even "Technidigm Novices" can determine a relative "Technidigm Capability Score" for themselves, their managers, their politicians, and even their favorite news men and women. These numeric scores support the identification of our past, current, and future leaders through rough numerical approximations, resulting in relative risk determinations similar to everyday practices in the nuclear industry.

Improvising the Score Alfred Music

Ever since the early 1970s, sculptor Charles Ray's protean practice has yielded some of the most memorable objects and experiences in contemporary art, causing us to confront, as Peter Schjeldahl has written, "elegant, deadpan fabrications that flip wild switches in our minds." In 1987's "Ink Line," for example, he sent a single stream of ink flowing to the middle of a gallery's floor in a slender column; outside the 1993 Whitney Biennial he parked a massive replica of a toy fire engine. His recent work is just as alluring and unsettling: a steel sculpture of a handheld bird, a poster of an ominous pumpkin, an intricate cast aluminum sculpture of a tractor. Charles Ray surveys the work the artist has made in the past dozen

years; an interview by Michael Fried and an essay by John Kelsey complement texts written about each work by Ray himself.

Charles Ray (*1953 in Chicago) is widely regarded as one of the preeminent sculptors of our time. Like Katharina Fritsch and Jeff Koons, Ray strives toward three-dimensional figuration, which is evident in the white-painted steel sculpture *Boy with Frog*, 2009 - a work that was installed on the Punta della Dogana in Venice, where it was a major attraction. This catalogue has been published on the occasion of the exhibition «Charles Ray : Sculpture, 1997-2014» at the Kunstmuseum Basel and the Art Institute of Chicago and provides an overview of the major sculptures Ray has created since 1997, including several previously unpublished works. These works are examined in detail in essays by Michael Fried, Richard Neer, James Rondeau, and Anne M. Wagner.
