double marriage! And while things are

changing at home, the world beyond
their doors is even more unpredictable.
World War II is coming to an end, and

stands. Yuriko is used to the sirens and
the air-raid drills, but things start to feel
more real when the neighbors who have
left to fight stop coming home. When the
bombs hit Hiroshima, it's through
Yuriko's twelve-year-old eyes that we
witness the devastation and horror. This
is a story that offers young readers
insight into how children lived during the
war, while also introducing them to
Japanese culture. Based loosely on
author Kathleen Burkinshaw's mother's
firsthand experience surviving the
atomic bombing of Hiroshima, *The Last
Cherry Blossom* hopes to warn readers of
the immense damage nuclear war can
bring, while reminding them that the
"enemy" in any war is often not so
different from ourselves.

There is no consensus in the social and cultural sciences on what theory is, and that is as it should be. A consensus would be outright dangerous for the diversity of intellectual life.
