The importance of the environmental impact of wind farms both on- and offshore is recognized by expanded coverage, and the requirements of the Grid Codes to ensure wind energy plays its full role in the power system are described. The conceptual design chapter has been extended to include a number of novel concepts, including low induction rotors, multiple rotor structures, superconducting generators and magnetic gearboxes. References and further reading resources are included throughout the book and have been updated to cover the latest literature. As in previous editions, the core subjects constituting the essential background to wind turbine and wind farm design are covered. These include: The nature of the wind resource, including geographical variation, synoptic and diurnal variations, and turbulence characteristics. The aerodynamics of horizontal axis wind turbines, including the actuator disc concept, rotor disc

theory, the vortex cylinder model of the actuator disc and the Blade-Element/Momentum theory. Design loads for horizontal axis wind turbines, including the prescriptions of international standards. Alternative machine architectures. The design of key components. Wind turbine controller design for fixed and variable speed machines. The integration of wind farms into the electrical power system. Wind farm design, siting constraints, and the assessment of environmental impact. The global wind power industry installed 7976 MW in 2004, an increase in total installed generating capacity of 20%.
