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 What is Direct & Indirect Speech? Direct Speech: the message of the speaker is conveyed or reported in his own actual words without any change.
 Direct and Indirect Speech: Rules, examples and exercises
 When we report something using the exact words of the speaker, we use direct speech. When we report something in our own words, we use indirect speech.

Direct speech: The boy said, 'I'm happy with my results.'
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 Reported commands, requests and advice. The commands, requests and advice mostly have the same form in English: verb + object + infinitive (advise, ask, beg, forbid, order, persuade, recommend, tell, urge, warn etc.). In the direct speech we do not mention the person in the imperative. In the indirect speech the person addressed must be mentioned.
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 The first word of the reported speech begins with a capital letter. The reported speech is separated by a comma from the reporting verb.
 ii) In Indirect Speech: Inverted commas are not used but the reported speech is generally introduced by the conjunction "that". The comma separating the reporting verb from the reported speech is removed.
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 Rule IV. Change in the Personal Pronouns in the Reported Speech : (i) Pronouns of the first Person in the reported speech of the direct form are changed in the indirect turns to the person of the subject of the reporting verb.
 He said, " I am not guilty. (Direct) He said that he was not guilty. (Indirect)
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 When a writer simply wants to carry the gist, or meaning, of the actual words a person uses is when reported speech, or indirect speech, comes into play.
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 Normally, the tense in reported speech is one tense back in time from the tense in direct speech:
 She said, "I am tired." = She said that she was tired.

 If you use Reported Speech there are mostly two main differences. The introductory sentence in Reported Speech can be in the Present or in the Past . If the introductory sentences is in the Simple Present, there is no backshift of tenses.
