First produced in 1957, Endgame brilliantly captures the essential vulnerability and absurdity of human beings in its presentation of the blind and paralyzed Hamm, his lame servant Clov, and Hamm's elderly, ash-bin-confined parents Nell and Nagg, all confronting questions of existence and purpose amid seeming hopelessness.
