 Hosea 6:1-3 has been interpreted variously by exegetes. While some view it to record the Hosea's call of the people to repentance, others see it as portraying the prophet's prayer to the Lord on the behalf of the people. Still, another group view it as a lament of the people before the Lord, that is, the people's repentance. However, in the third paper in book, I expose the pericope as portraying instead God's people's fake repentance, thus advocating for the

views of some other scholars. THE ULTIMATE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN THE RIGHTEOUS AND THE WICKED: AN EXEGESIS OF MALACHI 3:19-20 After God has rebuked his people for various sins in Malachi 1-3, chapter 4 shows the future retributions of both the wicked and the righteous.
