True Principles of Pointed or Christian Architecture was first published in 1841, when Pugin was 29

years old. Here he presents coherent arguments for the revival of the Gothic style, the case for which he had made pictorially in his sensational book *Contrasts* (1836). Although Muthesius is known best in Anglo-American architectural literature for his studies of the English house, his scholarship constituted a wide-ranging modernist polemic emanating from the German realist movement of the late 1890s.
