In these eloquent essays,
the noted scholar and
activist Vincent Harding
reflects on the forgotten
legacy of Martin Luther
King, Jr., and the meaning

of his life today. Many of
these reflections are
inspired by the ambiguous
message surrounding the
official celebration of
King's birthday. Harding
sees a tendency to freeze
an image of King from the
period of his early
leadership of the Civil
Rights movement, the
period culminating with
his famous "I Have a
Dream Speech". Harding

writes passionately of
King's later years, when
his message and witness
became more radical and
challenging to the status
quo at every level. In
those final years before
his assassination King
took up the struggle
against racism in the
urban ghettos of the
North; he became an
eloquent critic of the
Vietnam war; he laid the

foundations for the Poor People's Campaign. This widening of his message and his tactics entailed controversy even within his own movement. But they point to a consistent expansion of his critique of American injustice and his solidarity with the oppressed. It was this spirit that brought him to Memphis in 1968 to lend his support to striking sanitation workers. It was there that he paid the final price for his prophetic witness.

During the 1990s, the Eastern Caribbean was caught in a bitter trade dispute between the US and EU over the European banana market. When the World Trade Organization rejected preferential access for Caribbean growers in 1998 the effect on the region's rural communities was devastating. This volume examines the "banana wars" from the vantage point of St. Lucia's Mabouya Valley, whose recent, turbulent history reveals the impact of global forces. The author

This history gave way to a new harsh reality, in which neoliberal policies privilege price and quantity over human

rights and the environment. However, against these challenges, the author shows how the rural poor have responded in creative ways, including new social movements and Fair Trade farming, in order to negotiate a stronger position for themselves in the in a shifting global economy.

Why should the law care about enforcing contracts? We tend to think of a contract as the legal embodiment of a moral obligation to keep a promise. When two parties enter into a

transaction, they are obligated as moral beings to play out the transaction in the way that both parties expect. But this overlooks a broader understanding of the moral possibilities of the market. Just as Shakespeare's Shylock can stand on his contract with Antonio not because Antonio is bound by honor but because the enforcement of contracts is seen as important to maintaining a kind of social arrangement, today's contracts serve a fundamental role in the
