Elizabeth Rex
As Jennifer Atkins suggests in *New Orleans Carnival Balls*, Mardi Gras has a secret side. After masking and parading through the streets, krewes retreat to theaters, convention centers, and banquet

halls to spend the evening at lavish balls where krewe members could cultivate their sense of fraternity and celebrate their shared values.

Atkins uses the concept of dance as a lens for examining Carnival, allowing her to delve deeper into the historical context and distinctive rituals of Mardi Gras in New Orleans. Dancing is a particularly illuminating social practice, and by using it to probe into old-line festivities, Atkins is able to decode the mysterious rituals that have mostly remained secret. Beyond presenting readers with a new means of thinking about Mardi Gras, Atkins's work situates dance as culturally and socially relevant to historical inquiry, contributing to our understanding of the usefulness of dance in examining the past.

The events of Timothy Findley's *Elizabeth Rex* take place in Elizabethan England. Queen Elizabeth I visits the Lord Chamberlain's men after they perform *Much Ado About Nothing* for her and meets Ned Lowenscroft, female impersonator of Shakespeare's company. The confrontation between these two

characters is one that exposes, in Findley's words, a contradiction of genders." It also modernizes the two Renaissance figures in ways that make them relevant to modern audiences. The Shakespearean boy-actor is a suitable character for a play that focuses on gender roles: the contradiction between Ned's male body and feminine looks and behaviour exposes the fluidity of gender. Findley transforms the boy-actor, however, into a thirty-year old homosexual female impersonator, making him closer to a present-day drama queen than a Renaissance boy-actor. Furthermore, Ned's fatal syphilis, transmitted to him by his lover Hal, is highly reminiscent of AIDS today. The virgin queen also displays the arbitrariness of gender by the contradiction between her manly body politic and her female body natural. Elizabeth I was aware of this conflict that accompanied and threatened her throughout her reign, but she was able to use it to her own benefit by adopting attributes of both genders: she was princess, prince, queen, king, warrior, virgin,

mother, and wife to her kingdom. Like Ned, Elizabeth is an appropriate character for a play that has gender as its central theme. Ned and Elizabeth's gender ambiguity reveals gender as unnatural, as independent from sex, and as a performance played on the world that is a stage. In their intense theatrical confrontation, Ned the woman learns how to play the man and Elizabeth the man learns how to play the woman. They literally perform alternative genders by the use of role-playing. Their alternating between man and woman weakens the established gender dichotomies without however transcending them. Furthermore, by showing us the woman behind the king and the man behind the actor, Findley is not only playing with gender but also with history, re-writing the female impersonator and the virgin queen in ways that traditional historical documents are incapable of uncovering.

Shakespeare in Canada is the result of a collective desire to explore the role

that Shakespeare has played in Canada over the past two hundred years, but also to comprehend the way our country's culture has influenced our interpretation of his literary career and heritage. What function does Shakespeare serve in Canada today? How has he been reconfigured in different ways for particular Canadian contexts? The authors of this book attempt to answer these questions while imagining what the future might hold for William Shakespeare in Canada. Covering the Stratford Festival, the cult CBC television program *Slings and Arrows*, major Canadian critics such as Northrop Frye and Marshall McLuhan, the influential acting teacher Neil Freiman, the rise of Québécois and First Nation approaches to Shakespeare, and Shakespeare's place in secondary schools today, this collection reflects the diversity and energy of Shakespeare's afterlife in Canada. Collectively, the authors suggest that Shakespeare continues to offer Canadians "remembrance of ourselves." This is a refreshingly original and impressive contribution to Shakespeare studies—a

And in navigating both American bureaucracy and the fraught history and present of South Sudan, she conveys an urgent message about the devolving state of US foreign policy.

Timothy Findley (1930-2002) was one of Canada's foremost writers—an award-winning novelist, playwright, and short-story writer who began his career as an actor in London, England. Findley was instrumental in the development of Canadian literature and publishing in the 1970s and 80s. During those years, he became a vocal advocate for human rights and the anti-war movement. His writing and interviews reveal a man concerned with the state of the world, a man who believed in the importance of not giving in to despair, despite his constant struggle with depression. Findley believed in the power of

imagination and creativity to save us. *Tiff: A Life of Timothy Findley* is the first full biography of this eminent Canadian writer. These qualities inform canonic works like *The Wars* (1977), *Famous Last Words* (1981), *Not Wanted on the Voyage* (1984), and *The Piano Man's Daughter* (1995).

century. Typical sketches mention the date and place of birth and marriage of the biographee; the name of

his wife and the names of his children; names with dates and places of birth of his parents and often grandparents; sometimes the name of the first

ancestor in America; and details of religion, education, military service, occupation, home, and residence.

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
